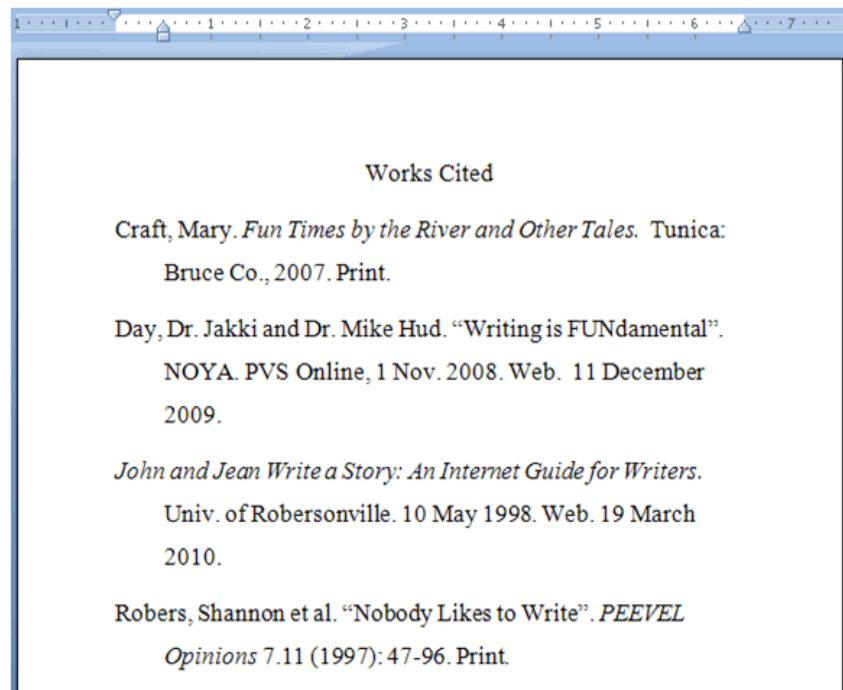

Print Sources (Books)

BOOK WITH ONE AUTHOR:

Author's last name, First name. *Book Title*. Publisher, Publication date.

EXAMPLE:

Jackson, Donna M. *Extreme Scientists: Exploring Nature's Mysteries from Perilous Places*. Houghton Mifflin Books for Children, 2009.

BOOK BY TWO OR THREE (or more) AUTHORS

1st Author's Last Name, 1st Author's First Name, 2nd Author's First Name and Last Name, 3rd Author's First Name and Last Name (if needed). *Title of Book*. Publisher, Publication Date.

EXAMPLE: Woodford, Chris, and Martin Clowes. *Atoms and Molecules*. San Diego: Blackbirch, 2004. Print.

Electronic Sources

ARTICLE OR PAGE ON A WEBSITE

Editor/Author's last name, First name. "Article Title/Page Title." *Webpage Title*. Version number (if known), Name of Institution affiliated with the site (sponsor or publisher), Date posted or last updated, URL, DOI or permalink (without https://). Date of access.

EXAMPLE:

Ornes, Stephen. "Brain Cells Take a Break." *Science News for Kids: Home Page*. Society of Science & the Public, 15 July 2009. Web. 24 Sept. 2009.

Periodicals/Scholarly Journals

SCHOLARLY/SCIENTIFIC JOURNAL

Author(s). "Title of Article." *Title of Journal*, Volume, Issue, Year, pages.

EXAMPLE:

Duvall, John N. "The (Super)Marketplace of Images: Television as Unmediated Mediation in DeLillo's *White Noise*." *Arizona Quarterly*, vol. 50, no. 3, 1994, pp. 127-53.

MAGAZINE OR NEWSPAPER

Author(s). "Title of Article." *Title of Periodical*, Day Month Year, pages.

EXAMPLES:

Krugman, Andrew. "Fear of Eating." *New York Times*, 21 May 2007, late ed., p. A1.

Buchman, Dana. "A Special Education." *Good Housekeeping*, Mar. 2006, pp. 143-48.

ARTICLE FROM DATABASE

Author(s). "Title of Article" *Title of Journal*. Volume, Issue, Date of Publication. *Database where article was accessed*, URL, DOI or Permalink. Date of Access.

EXAMPLE:

Alonso, Alvaro. "Toxicity of Nitrite to Three Species of Freshwater Invertebrates." *Environmental Toxicology*, vol. 21, no. 1, 3 Feb. 2006, pp. 90-94. *Explora Secondary Schools*, doi: 10.1002/tox.20155.
