
Verbals Practice1: Gerunds, Infinitives, and Participles

DIRECTIONS: Decide if the underlined word is a verb, gerund, infinitive, or participle, and write the answer on the line provided. Be careful and remember: **verbs** cannot be **verbals!**

- If it is a participle, CIRCLE the noun it is modifying or describing.
- If it is an infinitive, write whether it is being used as a noun, adjective, or adverb.
- HINT: Often, it is helpful to first find the subject and predicate (verb) of the sentence.
